Biographical Sketch & Scope and Content Note

Acquisition records for the James M. Lovering Papers are nonexistent. For ease of access, the collection has been assigned a current accession number (1983-91) and may be located by that number in the repository.

The James M. Lovering Papers comprise three Hollinger document boxes, spanning the period 1844-1890, and consist largely of correspondence. The bulk of the correspondence concerns professional matters but some personal correspondence from his wife and other family members is included. Miscellaneous receipts and other financial documents can be found in the last two folders of Box three.

James Monroe Lovering was born in Hampton, New Hampshire on October 12, 1817. He graduated from Hampton Academy and it was in that town that he first learned the business of a trader. Lovering moved to Exeter, New Hampshire in 1839 and went into business with Harrison Prescott, under the firm name of Prescott and Lovering. Some time in 1841 or 1842, the firm dissolved and James Lovering opened business on his own, continuing until 1849. During this time, he was a strong Whig supporter. He was elected town clerk of Exeter in 1847 and held the post until 1850. In 1854, Lovering went to Boston as bookkeeper for the American Steam Gauge Company. He became a prominent member of the Know Nothing Party at this time and was elected to represent the town of Exeter in the state legislature for three consecutive terms from 1855-1857. From 1855 to 1857 he served as Cashier of the Exeter bank and in 1860 was appointed Superintendent of the Folding Room in Washington by Gilman Marston, then sergeant-at-arms of the United States House of Representatives. Lovering served in that capacity until the Fall of 1862, when he was appointed Collector of Internal Revenue for the first collection district of New Hampshire, holding that office until April 29, 1869. In 1871 he was appointed an examiner in the U.S. Appraiser's office, Boston, and continued in that position until December 1884. In March, 1885 he received an appointment in the Boston Custom House, which office he held at the time of his death. Lovering was married twice, his first wife being Miss Nancy Brown of North Hampton, whom he married in 1842 and who died May 10, 1872. In the Fall of 1873 he married Mrs. Orianna M. Wingate. Monroe Lovering died at his residence in Exeter on August 24, 1885.
